Post 2020 CO₂ Targets for heavy duty vehicles

UPEI praises the introduction of a clear mandate for the European Commission to assess the full life-cycle emissions from heavy-duty vehicles (HDV) at EU level in the deal sealed by the European institutions on 19 February.

UPEI welcomes the European Commission's initiative to introduce CO₂ standards for the HDV sector for the first time, recognising the urgent need to cut GHG emissions from all segments of the transport sector.

The fuels sector is closely associated with vehicle manufacturing. Intensive work is ongoing to continue to build on past achievements and to improve the efficiency and environmental performance of fuels in transport. Solutions are required for the existing vehicle fleet which will have a significant lifespan to come, as well as for the future vehicle fleet which will combine improved known technologies with emerging, new technologies. Whilst vehicle manufacturers are in the front-line of the CO₂ standards for heavy-duty vehicles, the ambitious targets agreed will require a concerted and collective effort from other economic sectors, including the fuel supply sector and its customers.

UPEI believes that legislation should not bet on single solutions but should rather encourage the use of all fuels that demonstrate the capability to cut emissions. Abrupt or artificially-driven promotions of single technologies not only severely distort the market, but also slow down current progress towards a greater availability of lower-emissions alternatives such as sustainable biofuels, synthetic fuels, etc. To do so, a technology-neutral methodology for assessing vehicles' emissions is essential.

In this context, UPEI welcomes the introduction, of a provision mandating the European Commission to, no later than 2023, "evaluate the possibility of developing a common Union methodology for the assessment and the consistent data reporting of the full life-cycle CO2 emissions of heavy-duty vehicles that are placed on the Union market". We are also pleased that, by 2022, the Commission shall assess the possibility of developing a methodology to include the "potential contribution to emission reductions of the use of synthetic and advanced alternative liquid and gaseous renewable fuels, including e-fuels produced with renewable energy".

This measure sends the right signal to developers who are working on solutions in the fuels sector, that can be applied to future technologies as well as existing ones. UPEI is committed to engage with the European Commission for the development of such methodology and follow up measures such as legislative proposals.

UPEI and its members will continue playing a pivotal role in the transition towards more sustainable mobility, and as such will further support efficient, balanced and ambitious policy-making.

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UPEI represents nearly 2,000 European importers and wholesale/retail distributors of energy for the transport and heating sectors, supplying Europe's customers independently of the major energy producers. They are the interface between producers and consumers, using their own infrastructure and flexibility to supply existing demand for conventional and renewable liquid fuels, as well as non-liquid alternatives as part of the energy transition.
